

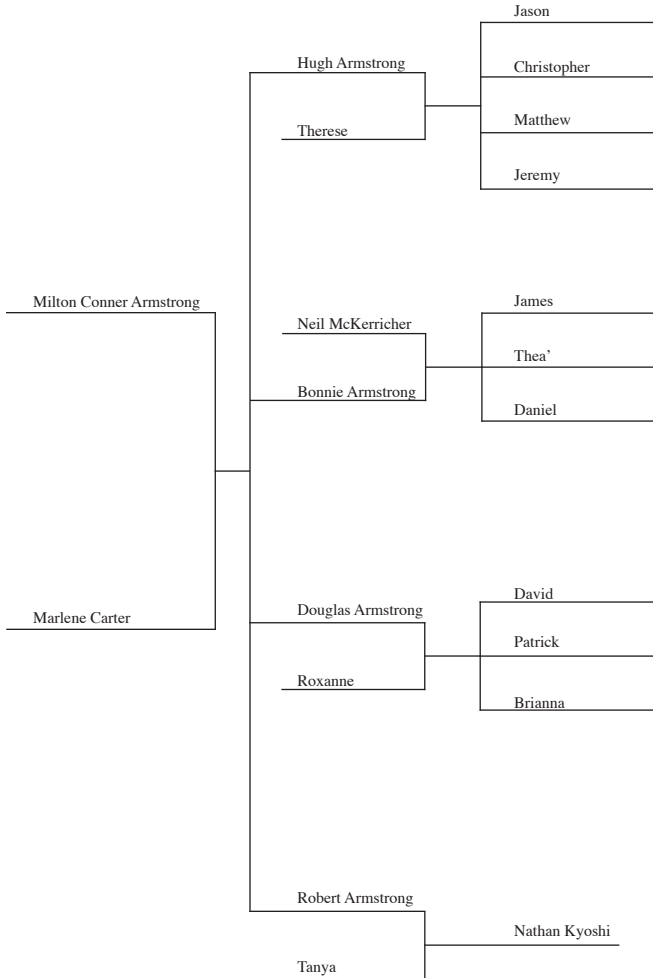

Marlene married Milton Connor Armstrong on June 11, 1956 in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. Connor is an electronic technician and has worked for the government in many areas. In Ottawa, Ontario, as well as Churchill, Manitoba, Canada, he worked for the Defense Research Board. In Prince Albert, Saskatchewan he worked at the Radar Lab. In Nanaimo, (Nan i' mo) he was employed at the Department of Fisheries. He has a workshop at home and still does some work for the biological station. Marlene works at the Malaspina Lodge, a rest home in Nanaimo, British Columbia, Canada where she and

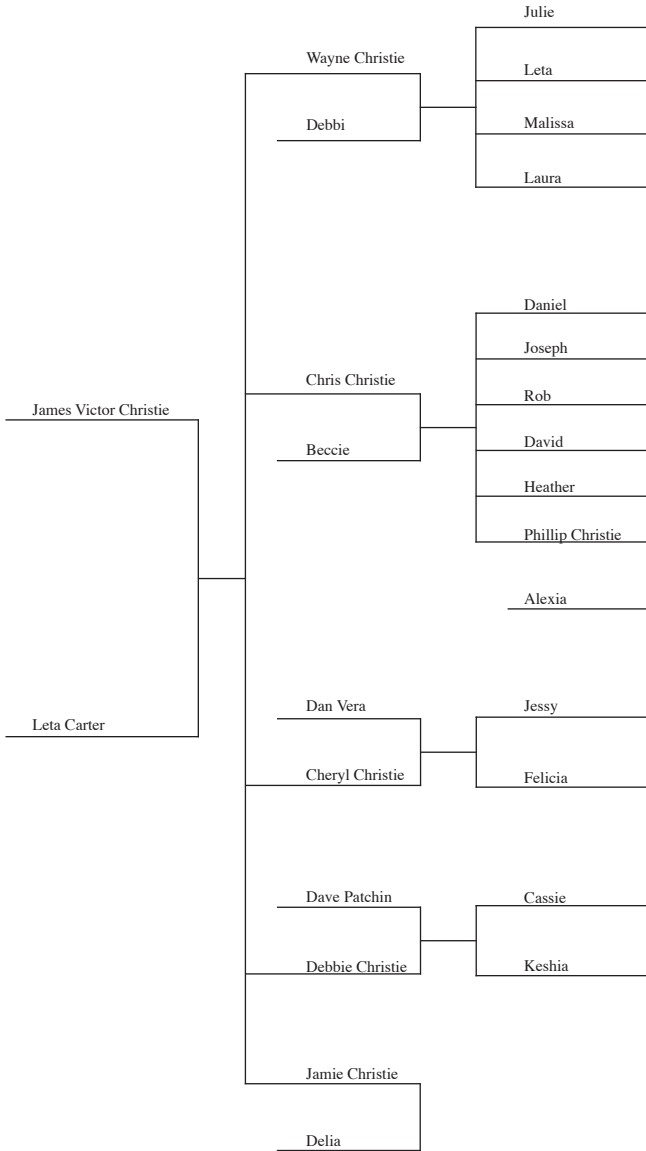

Leta Carter (Christie) was born on December 13, 1937 in Raymond, Alberta, Canada, as the tenth child of Viva Jones and Lamonde L. Carter. Leta was married to James Christie on February 24, 1954 in Nelson, British Columbia, Canada. James left his home in Vancouver, Canada at age sixteen and joined the Merchant Marines. Then he worked in the mines and later for the railroads. Afterward he started working as a fireman in Nelson. During the 1950s some Russian-descent people living around Nelson were angry at the government and started planting explosives in government buildings. The firemen were required to dismantle the bombs, and James' picture and article appeared in the local paper. James met Wil Carter. They were at the same dance one evening and it was there he met Wil's sister, Leta. Not long afterwards, James and Leta were married. They are the parents of five children, four born in Nelson: Wayne, Christopher, Cheryl, and Debbie.

The fire department had to lay off some men and James was among those who lost their jobs. He and Leta moved to Sacramento in 1962 where their last son, James Eldon Christie, was born. The home they left in Nelson was in the mountains overlooking Kootenay Lake. They had to trade that wonderful outdoor atmosphere for a small two-bedroom duplex in Sacramento. That move was hard for the oldest son, Wayne, who was eight years old at the time. He missed their nature-filled environ-

ment with the beautiful lake, the wildlife and trees left behind where he could roam all over. They later moved to a house in Sacramento with nearly an acre of land.

James Christie was a truck driver for awhile after their move, and eventually he worked for the A.B. Dick Office Equipment Company. In 1977, he moved to Boise, Idaho with a partner, bought a dealership and they opened an A.B. Dick Office Equipment store there. However, the sudden death of his partner put a financial strain on the business and at the same time the economy was bad. He no longer has that business but works for Hewlett-Packard in Boise, Idaho. For awhile he was almost legally blind until a cataract operation restored his eyesight.

Leta worked for Sports U.S.A. Distributors in Sacramento as a bookkeeper and executive secretary to the president of the company. She taught in Primary, MIA and Relief Society. Wayne remembered his growing up years fondly. He said his mother was never negative, even later on when she knew she was dying of cancer. She was an energetic person, fun loving, and made friends easily with everyone. She built a relationship with Wayne's long-haired friends that made them want to come to the house even after Wayne left for his mission.

Wayne said he and his mother grew up together as she was only sixteen when she got married. She was good to

be around, easy going, and yet made you think about what you were doing. She expected the best from you, but was never demanding. She gave a lot of love to her children and made sure they had fun. One time she caught Wayne smoking. She had gone away in the car, and since his dad smoked, Wayne had easy access to cigarettes and thought he would try it out. When he saw his mother return home, he hurriedly flushed it down the toilet. Leta came into the house and then left and got into the car again. Wayne thought, “Whew, I got away with it.” Just then his mother honked the horn for him to come out to the car. It seemed the cigarette did not flush down. She said to him, “Wayne, I don’t think I’d smoke that cigarette. It’s too wet!” Wayne remarked, when you were being mischievous, my mother always knew how to handle it.

Another time when Leta’s daughter, Debbie, got in trouble she said to her mother, “Do you want to hear the truth or a lie?” Leta replied, “Let’s hear the lie first.” Leta was very pretty and youthful looking and there were times store clerks, or Wayne’s friends, who may see them passing by in a car, thought she was his girlfriend. He would say, “No, she’s my mother.” They would say, “NO way!”

About one year after Wayne was away on his mission, Leta found out she had bone cancer. It was just before her son, Christopher, left for his mission. That was very hard for him to leave, knowing he would never see his

mother again. It was at that time she wrote something for a family history book on her father, Lamonde Carter's ancestry referred to as the 'Chidester Heritage.' She wrote that her oldest son, Wayne, left for an LDS Minnesota-Wisconsin Mission in April 1974, and that one year later her son, Christopher, left in July 1975 for a Canadian-Halifax Mission. Debbie wrote about what happened to her mother in 1975 just before Chris left for his mission:

“We were a happy and close Mormon family ... Not only was she my mother, but my best friend. We did everything together, from swimming to playing baseball, but what we did the most was go for bike rides together. She was a very healthy person, didn't smoke or drink and was still very young at heart ... No matter who you were or what you believed, she accepted you as you were and never asked her to change. She was honest in everything she would ever say or do, and never made anyone feel out of place. No matter how big the problem, she could always make it seem so small; with loving words and a helpful hand your problems were solved.

It was about February tenth, my mother and I went out riding our bikes. We were on our way home when her tire hit the curb and she fell off her bike landing on her leg and bruising her knee very badly, but never gave it a second thought. ... A couple of days passed by and she noticed a little bump on her knee where the bruise

used to be ... At first [the doctors] thought it was water on the knee ... It was February 14, 1975 when my mother found out she might have cancer. My parents had been invited to the church Valentine's dance and they still went, knowing she was going to be checked into the hospital a couple of days later for a biopsy. This is when she found out that she did have cancer and they would have to amputate her leg above the knee. ... At this time I would have fallen to pieces. But my mother didn't. She accepted it as God's will, and she was still the loving mother and wife she had always been."

Besides cancer forcing Leta to have her left leg amputated, she wrote in the Chidester history about having a ten-inch wide lump in her breast that caused quite a bit of pain, but she said, "I'm still able to go places and do things, so my spirits are high." She never openly felt sorry for herself. She said there are other people worse off than she was.

About that time, a friend's daughter became paralyzed from her waist down in an accident, and even though Leta was in much pain herself, she went to give them help in their trial. She often fed or gave food to other people worse off than she was.

The very day Leta got home from the hospital after her amputation, she attended her son's ball game and sat in the bleachers. When the doctor fitted her with a wooden

leg, she said, “Give me one with a tan; my legs have always been too white.” At the time she was trying to learn to walk with the prosthesis, she went to a grocery store on crutches and people asked about her injury. She answered, she had twisted her ankle. She remarked, “Why ruin their day!” Leta got special permission from the Church office in Salt Lake to visit Wayne while he was on his mission. She brought with her the girl he later married, Debra Nelson. Once when Wayne was 16, and Debra was 14, Leta said to Wayne, “See that girl over there! You’re going to marry her.” Wayne remarked, “She’s too skinny!” Debbie Christie (Patchin) wrote:

“The doctors gave her two months to live. The cancer in her chest grew to the size of a basketball making it hard on her to breath. The whole time my mother was ill she never used any kind of pain relievers. She ate only the natural foods the Lord put on the earth, and never once did she complain to anyone of the pain. It was hard going to school everyday and not knowing if my mother was going to be there when I got home. ... My mother lived twenty-two months longer than the doctors said she would. We believe the reason she did live as long as she did was because of her faith in the Lord, and her love for living.”

Leta died at age 39, on May 14, 1977 at her home in Sacramento. Leta’s family and all who knew her were impressed with her great courage. Her sis-

ter, Wenona, said even after her amputation she went on a scout trip because she was a den leader.

Viva Jones Carter, Leta's mother, spent the last five months taking care of Leta in her home in Sacramento. She said this experience was something she would always treasure. Leta was an inspiration to all who knew her. It was said that Elder Thomas Monson once phoned Leta, and that President Spencer W. Kimball prayed for her in the prayer circle at the temple. Cheryl, Leta's daughter, was eighteen when her mother passed away, and she related that each of the children received a very special individual letter from their mother after her death. Cheryl told, also, of how her father found little notes Leta had written to him for up to a month afterwards. She had tucked them away here and there in drawers and various places. Shortly after his wife's death, James moved to Boise, Idaho. Jim is now living in Rathdrum, Idaho, working.

Wayne Victor Christie is the oldest child born to Leta Carter and James Christie on August 22, 1954 in Nelson, British Columbia, Canada. He served his Minnesota-Wisconsin mission and then came home and married the girl his mother had earlier predicted he would, Debra Nelson. Their marriage took place on September 11, 1976 in the Oakland, California Temple. Debra's mother, Jo La Cata, had been Leta's best friend. Wayne is the general manager of California Copy in

Stockton, California. They sell office equipment and copy and fax machines. For recreation, Wayne runs and jogs. In 1991 he ran the 26-mile race in the California National Marathon and finished it going from Folsom City to the State Capitol in Sacramento. He likes to fish and camp, but mostly enjoys being with his children. He and Debbie taught the Merry Miss and Blazer primary classes together. They live in Elk Grove and attend the Third Ward. Debbie makes clothes and wedding dresses for other people and enjoys sewing. But her main hobby, like Wayne, is being with their four daughters: Julia Ann, Leta Cheri, Melissa Jo and Laura Kim.

Christopher James Christie was born in Nelson, British Columbia. While on his LDS mission in Canada, he served in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island. Afterward, he met Rebecca Ludwig at the Young Adult activities. They were married on March 21, 1978 in the Oakland, California Temple. Christopher had two years at California State Sacramento and took courses at American River College in Carmichael. He is an engineer in research and development for Micron Technology in Boise, Idaho. His company gives him ongoing training and courses. Chris enjoys building and working on computers. Christopher and Becci have six children: Phillip, Daniel, Joseph, Robert, David, and Heather Christie. Becci is related to the Mayflower Pilgrims through the Fuller line; her ancestor was a sister of

James Eldon Christie is the last child of Leta and James Christie. He was twelve when his mother died of cancer in 1977 at Sacramento, where he was born. He lives in Boise, Idaho where he works for Micron Technology.

Notes by Leta and Viva:

Our oldest boy left for his mission in the Minnesota-Wisconsin area in April 1974. One year later April 21, 1975, the doctors amputated my right leg with bone cancer. On July 26, 1975, our second son left for his Canada-Halifax mission.

The bone cancer is in my breast bone now and is a lump about ten inches wide. I'm in pain quite a bit now but I'm still able to go places and do things so my spirits

are high. Our oldest boy is now (1976) home from his mission and is engaged to be married September 10, 1976.

“Our daughter passed away 14th May. We will miss her very much but are relieved that she is now free from suffering. It was a privilege to be with her for the five months, something I will always treasure. She was an inspiration to all who knew her.

Elder Monson phoned her one night about a month before she passed away and the next morning President Kimball prayed for her in the prayer circle, which made her very happy.”

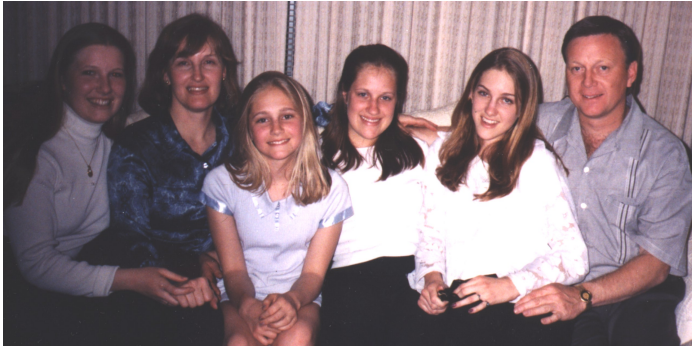

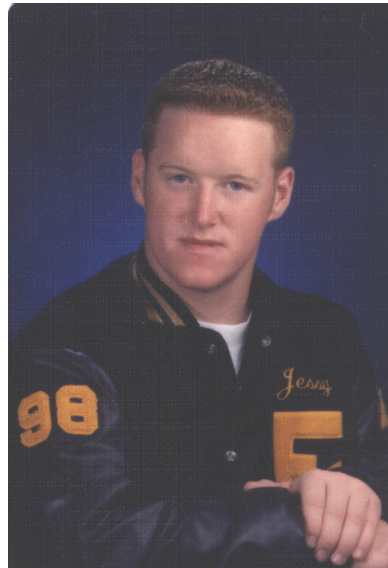

Cheryl and Dan have two children. Jessy Daniel and Felicia Noel Vera.

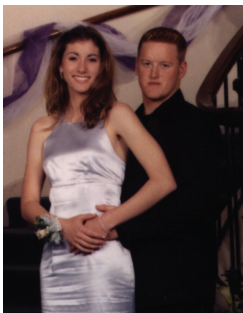


Jessy was born April 16, 1980 in Sacramento, Ca. He is currently attending University of California Davis majoring in Communications

Bernard Gregg Carter was the eleventh child of Viva Jones and Lamonde Carter. He was born on August 30, 1939 in Raymond, Alberta, Canada. He died on July 23, 1943 at the age of 4, one week before his sister, Lucille. They both died of the same cause, one week apart. They died of infected throat, which was thought to be caused from the unsanitary conditions near where they played. The family lived near a meat processing plant where they killed the animals and left the innards on a dumping ground to rot. That would no longer be permitted and the company would be heavily fined and forced to clean it up.

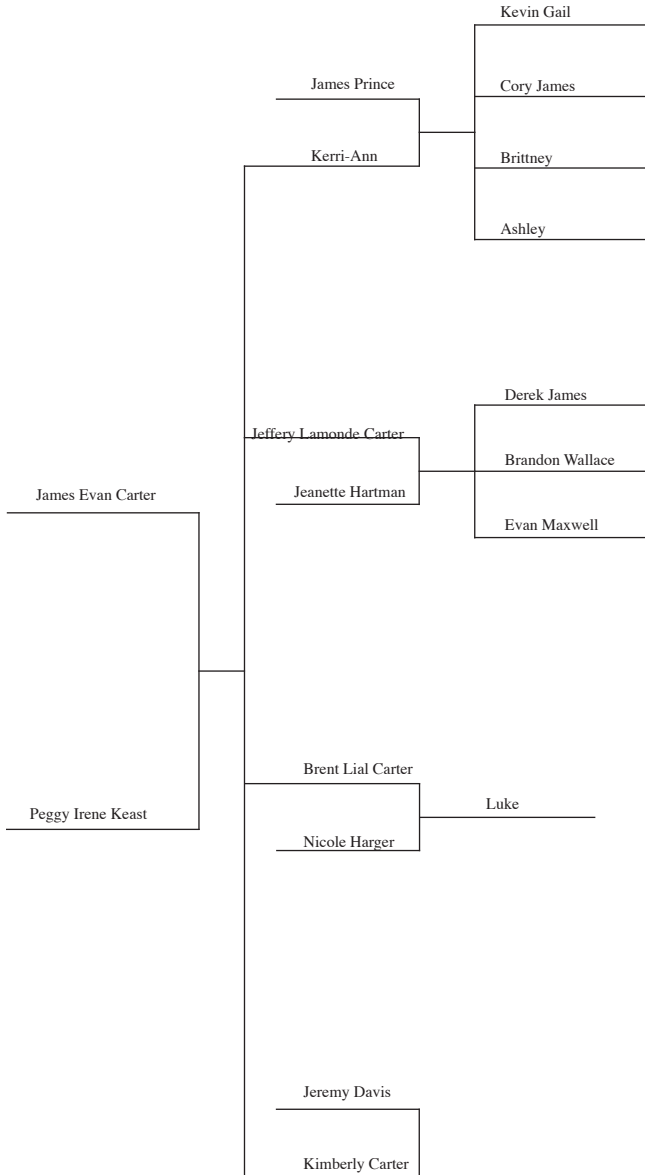

Personal History of James Evan and Peggy Irene Keast Carter

The Early Years – Jim

I was born in the upstairs of our home at 1307 A 11th Ave., Calgary, Alberta, Canada. I am the 12th of 14 children of Viva Jones and Lamonde Lial Carter. My parents were both born in Utah – Dad in Provo and Mom in Aurora near Salina.

Although I was born in Calgary, my family moved to Nelson, British Columbia, Canada when I was the baby of the family and about two years old. So I grew up in a small town in Western Canada.

Growing up in Nelson was wonderful. It was and is a very small town of about 6,000 people with mountains, lakes and rivers creating a very beautiful scene. If you consider the surrounding towns there were about 10,000 people in the area. But to get another town of more than 6,000 people you had to travel 50 miles (80 kilometers) to Trail, B.C.

Our yard was about a quarter of an acre, which was large enough for two pear trees, four apple trees, three cherry trees, two plum trees, a strawberry patch and a large garden. Dad would have fertilizer put on the garden every

couple of years. (In those days, fertilizer was raw cow manure) and he would dig the garden with a shovel. The soil was very good and we would generally have enough potatoes and vegetables from our own garden to last through the winter. The main vegetables were potatoes, carrots and beets.

In the front of the home was grass and a dirt path leading up to the home. When I was about fourteen years old Dad put in a cement sidewalk which was really “top drawer.” About the same time we got a lawn mower and started mowing the grass and called it a lawn. It was about this same time that we put a bathroom in the home and for the first time we had indoor plumbing and could take a bath in a real bathtub.

Prior to this time, bath day was Saturday night. Mom would heat up water on the kitchen stove and a galvanized iron tub about four or five foot in diameter was placed in the middle of the kitchen floor. The water was about 8 to 12 inches deep, which would then allow you to sit in the tub and have a bath. Kids would be paraded through the tub until the water needed changing and Dad and one of the older boys would carry the dirty water outside and dump it and the ritual would be repeated. My parents were always very modest in terms of the boys and girls being in the room together while bathing but it was standard procedure for the three youngest boys (Jim, Marv and Gary)

to bath in the same water. Because we were the youngest we also bathed last. Age has its privileges.

I grew up with two younger brothers (Marvin and Gary), an older brother (Wilson) and three older sisters (Leta, Marlene and Ferl). The oldest brothers and sisters were either married or serving in World War II. Milo is the oldest child and served in the Airforce. My second oldest brother Joe was wounded in Normandy and was the only one to go overseas. Bill (Wilburn) helped build the Alaska Canadian highway. John (#4 child) was too young to serve during World War II. Wenona is the fifth child and the oldest girl in the family. By the time we were growing up in Nelson, she was married and living in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

As children we used to fight the way kids do but we all enjoy each other as adults and are grateful for our family. My immediate older brother Greg and a sister Lucille died of diphtheria within one week when we lived in Calgary. I, of course, have no recollection of Greg and Lucille. When we lived in Nelson, the guys would get together and play softball or we would go up to the Great Northern Railway tracks which were about a quarter to a half mile above our home and we would walk along the tracks to the wooden trestles which crossed streams coming out of the mountains. We would play on the trestles and in the water.

There were very few televisions when I was in my teens and computers hadn't even been imagined. I was a fairly good student in high school but nothing fantastic. There was very little to do in a small town as a teenager.

I think the greatest things my parents taught me as a youth was faith in my Savior and knowledge of His church, integrity in dealing with others and an excellent work ethic. Example is the best teacher.

Missionary Service

I served as a missionary in the Southern Australian Mission from December 1962 to December 1964. My mission president was Bruce R. McConkie who was a member of the Seventy and later became an Apostle. He was an excellent teacher and knew the doctrine of the church.

In April 1963, while I was serving in the small town of Bendigo, I was introduced to my future wife. She was not a member of the church and was referred to the missionaries by some friends who were new members of the church. We taught her about the church and since I was the junior companion, I got to baptize her. Peg was the first person I ever baptized. We fell in love, and even though I never kissed her until I was released as a missionary and back in the US, we knew we loved and cared

for each other.

As a missionary I served in Melbourne, Victoria, in Adelaide, South Australia and in Perth, West Australia. Each city was about 8 months but there were transfers within the suburbs as well. During my years as a missionary I was able to serve as a District Leader. I enjoyed serving and teaching the gospel and assisted about 40 people in learning about the Savior and joining the church.

I was released as a missionary and arrived in San Francisco on December 9, 1964. Peg had preceded me to the US. We had corresponded a few times from April 1963 to December 1964. Peg came over and stayed with my family from September 1964 until I arrived. We knew we

I graduated from Brigham Young University (BYU) with a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry in May 1966 while we were in this apartment.

2. The second home was a rented apartment at about 700 North and 200 East. We lived in this apartment for a summer.
3. The third apartment was a little two room detached home in behind the Jarvis home (August 1966 to May 1968). The address was approximately 2300 North 500 East, Provo, Utah. Our son Jeff was born October 9, 1967 while we lived in this home. Although the first three apartments were very small and humble, they were our home and we were grateful to be together as a family.
4. We purchased our first home from Glen and Dorothy Thomas. The address was 1474 North 300 West,

Provo, Utah, which was directly across the street from our first apartment. We lived in this home from May 1968 to September 1970. We lived upstairs and rented the downstairs to students (single guys). The student renters helped pay the mortgage and we were able to continue to survive as students.

I graduated from BYU with a Master of Science degree in Microbiology in May 1969.

5. We moved into an up-down duplex in Salt Lake City in 1970 and lived in the upstairs and rented the downstairs (September 1970 to September 1975). It was built as a duplex.

I was called

He was my former mission president when I served as a missionary in the Southern Australian Mission. Keith Humpherys (my brother-in-law) ordained me a High Priest.

I graduated with my Doctor of Philosophy degree in Medicinal Chemistry from the University of Utah. We left Salt Lake in September of 1975 but the degree was awarded in December 1975. We were living in the Chicago area in December and did not attend commencement exercises for receiving our doctorate degree.

6. We moved to the Chicago, Illinois area in September of 1975 and I had my first job in the pharmaceutical industry (September 1975 to May 1982). We lived at

I served as Bishop of the Gurnee Second Ward in the Wilmette Illinois Stake for a portion of this period.

7. We moved to New Jersey when I started work with Ortho Pharmaceutical – a division of Johnson & Johnson. I started in February 1982. The family moved at the end of the school year. I transferred from Ortho to Janssen in July 1985 and we were there until July 1991 when we moved to Maryland.

During the New Jersey years we lived in five homes and built three. We acted as contractor and subcontracted the work on the homes.

We rented a home at the corner of Sandhill Road and Cherryville-Stanton road outside Flemington while our first home was being completed.

The first home that we completed was on 10 acres and was in a rural area. The address was RD 5 Cherryville-Stanton Road, Flemington, New Jersey.

During the last two years in New Jersey I served as Bishop of the Clinton Ward in the Morristown, New Jersey Stake.

8. By the time we moved to Maryland in 1991, Kerri-Ann was married, Jeff was married, Brent was in college and Kim was in High School. Kim was living with Kerri-Ann in Houston for the summer. After building homes and living on acres of wooded land, we purchased a home in a sub-division. The address was 201 Upshire Circle, Gaithersburg, Maryland. I joined Boehringer Mannheim as Director Analytical Development and Quality Assurance in July of 1991. By April 1994 most of the management turned over and I left the company and started consulting. I determined from that time forth that I was a consultant and would not go back into any position within a company.
9. In July 1999 we moved from the home in Maryland to Henderson, Nevada. Our address is 299 Queen Creek Circle, Henderson, Nevada.
10. I worked as a consultant until I retired. At the time of this writing I have been consulting for over seven years. It is very enjoyable because Peg and I travel together and we are able to enjoy numerous beautiful places and many good people without having the hassles of company politics. It has always amazed

me that people will create problems for fellow workers and ultimately hurt the company where their only real motive is to try and make themselves look good to management.

Memorable Events – Up to High School (1956) to Mission (1962)

1. Because of the number of children in the home and just wanting to make and have my own money I had a couple of rather memorable jobs while growing up. Between about 8 and 10 years old I was a “box boy.” I would walk the alleys behind major stores and when they threw out cardboard boxes I would take them and sell them for 5 cents each to a Coca cola manufacturing plant in town. On a good Saturday I could earn 50 cents to one dollar and that was plenty for going to a show and buying some popcorn. Having money to spend was more important than having money to save at that point in my life.
2. When I was 10 years old I graduated from the cardboard box business and got a paper route delivering the local newspaper mainly on Silica Street. I had the route of about 150 customers until I was 12 or 13 and then passed it to my younger brothers Marv (Marvin) and Gary. The route and a second one we got stayed within the family for at least 7 years. This gave me

spending money of around \$10 per week. I helped the family by buying the milk and a few groceries and I always had money to spend. To deliver the newspapers I would get up at 5:30 or 6 and literally run the route and be through in time for breakfast at 8 AM and then be off to school. In the winter Mother would get up and make a fire in the wood burning stove and get the home warm before waking Marv, Gary and me to do our routes. There was no furnace or central heating in the home in those days. The home was cold enough in the early morning that there would be frost on the inside of the windows. So it was probably around 40 ° F inside and close to 0 ° F outside. We were kids and basically having fun. The cold temperature or depth of the snow only made it more fun.

3. The paper route and snow reminds me of the family bobsled. For Christmas one year my brother Wil (Wilson) built the family a bobsled. At the time he was studying to be an electrician with Kohle electric. The sled was about 8 feet long and would hold up to five kids with no problem. The person in front would put his feet on two steering bars (one on each side of the sled). He also had a rope to hold onto for pulling the sled up the hill and it could also help with the steering. Each of the rest of the kids would put his feet over the legs and onto the lap of the person in front of them. The back person would generally

push off to get the sled going and then kneel or sit on the back. The bobsled run was on the city streets and generally would be from the Great Northern Railway tracks to the bottom of Cherry Street (probably about a half-mile). If we turned and went down Latimer street the run was longer but there was more chance of meeting a car coming up the street in which case you would generally run the sled into the snow bank to avoid getting blood on the car. The bobsled made the winters and snow fun for many years.

4. The family did not have a car in those days and one memorable event with the bobsled was taking my sister Ferl to the Greyhound bus depot as she left to go to BYU for college. I think she must have started winter semester as the roads were very slick and good for sledding. We loaded Ferl and her suitcases and kids on the sled and rode right downtown to the bus depot. We were very proud of our sister going to college. This was not the norm for the family. Fond memories. Ferl going to college probably helped me decide that it was the right thing for me to do.
5. I attended LV Rogers High School in Nelson and was an above average student but not a great student. I would generally get B's or A's on my report card with some C's. I liked Math and Science especially chemistry and determined by about 10th grade that I wanted

to be a chemist. I of course had little idea as to what that meant or what I would actually do for a living but I have never regretted the profession I chose or the way I have been able to provide for my family.

6. In Canada you can take your first year of college at the High School. Getting your High School diploma is called Junior Matriculation and Grade 13 or the first year of college is called Senior Matriculation. I got my Junior Matriculation in 1959 and stayed in Nelson for the Senior Matriculation.
7. As a young person I enjoyed baseball and basketball. Most kids learned how to skate and play hockey in Canada and although I did play hockey one year I was never any good at it. I also enjoyed running and I think was generally in pretty good shape because of the paper route. In the 12 grade I won the cross-country race at the school. They did not have a cross-country team or compete with other schools the way it is now but one Friday they had a 3 to 4 mile race from the school to Gyro Park, around the old hospital and back to the school. I was not favored and so was able to run my own race and surprised everyone, including myself, that I won. I built up a big lead early and then hung on at the finish. The next year I was favored and finished sixth.
8. For the 60 – 61 school year I lived with Ferl and Keith

(Ferl Humpherys is my older sister. She met Keith Humpherys at BYU.) in Redwood City in the San Francisco Bay area and attended Foothill Junior College. I took chemistry, math, physics and then basic classes necessary for graduation.

I did not have money to go to college and was uncertain if I should. This was a turning point for me. If Ferl and Keith had not encouraged me and allowed me to live with them, I probably would not have finished my Bachelor of Science degree. I probably would not have gone on a mission for the church, which means I would not have met Peg. So I am very grateful for Ferl & Keith and for their providing for my needs at a critical time in my life.

Ferl & Keith have a daughter Teri who was about five years old when we were together in Redwood City. Teri was a beautiful little girl and became (and is) my favorite niece as a result of our living together. She had blonde hair and was cute as a bug's ear.

9. After living with Ferl & Keith for a year, I attended Brigham Young University for the 61 – 62 school year. This was my first year at a real University and it was quite overwhelming to me. I majored in chemistry and did OK with my classes but the competition was greater and I didn't have the maturity to really excel. I finished the school year with a 2.7 grade point av-

erage (3.0 is a B) and decided to go on a mission. Ferl & Keith had moved to Sacramento during this year and so I went to live with them and ended up working for Railway Express Corporation until

I left for Australia in late November 1962. While attending BYU I worked as a janitor on the old lower campus on University Avenue from 4 AM to 7 AM each morning. The second semester I got a job in the Chemistry department grading exam papers and being a teaching assistant for a Freshman chemistry laboratory. This was really “big time.” As I remember I was making \$1.25 per hour.

Getting the job with Railway Express was an experience. I had looked for almost a month for a job for the summer to save for a mission. I walked into Railway Express and asked for a job and was fortunate that I was talking to “the big boss.” I don’t remember his name, but he asked me if I was a student and where I went to school. I was afraid that would be the end

of it but I told him that I attended BYU. It turned out that he was a Mormon but not active in the faith. He hired me based upon my honesty and knowing the good work ethic that Mormons were noted for in those days. This was one of many experiences through my life where I have never regretted being honest or telling others that I was a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints.

Memorable Events – Our Family

Peg & I were married January 16, 1965 in the temple in Los Angeles. Benjamin T. Bowring married us. He was serving as president of the temple at the time and married us for all eternity. The temple ceremony pronounces eternal blessings upon the couple based upon faithfulness. We have always tried to keep covenants of fidelity and faithfulness to the Savior's church and to live worthy of blessings in our lives.

Peg had gone into labor but did not recognize what was happening as this was her first pregnancy. She kept feeling like she needed to go the bathroom and would sit on the toilet to no avail. Life is great and we are very grateful for family and friends. We love each other very much and hope that we have many years still remaining in this life and eternal life in the world to come. Ultimately our hope is in Christ as our Savior and we hope to be worthy to be in His presence and to be cleansed from our sins and worthy to enter the presence of the Father.

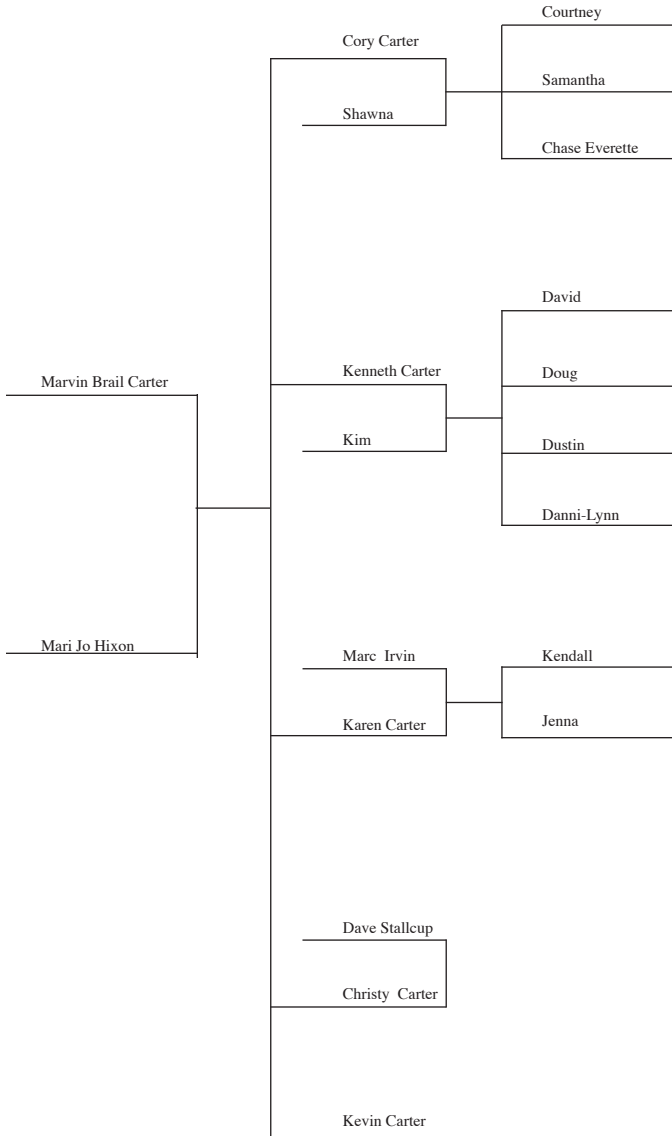

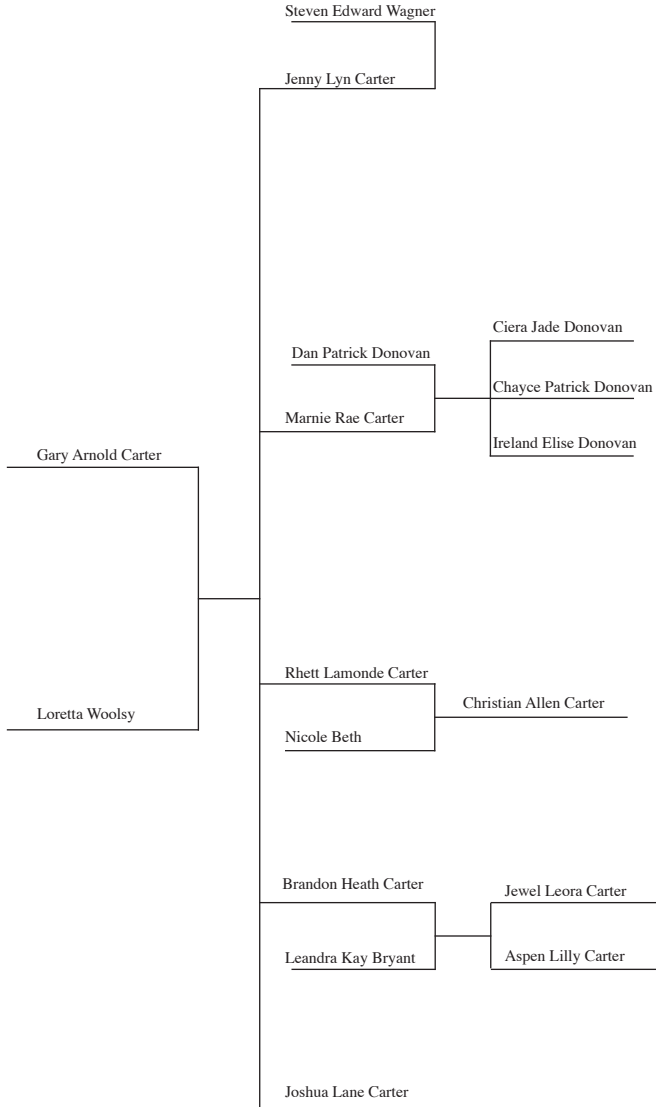
